

Come Unto Me, All Who Are Busy

September is always a full month in our chapel life, and this year is no exception. Then, on the **21st of September**, we welcome **Prof. Bill Cooke** to lead our **Academy Service**, bringing his wisdom as historian and philosopher. And to close the month, on the **27th**, we join together for the **Rivington Pilgrimage** — a reminder of the rich roots of our faith tradition. A busy September indeed!

I'll be honest — personally, I'm busy too. Alongside services and events, I'm finishing my studies with Unitarian College. There are moments when I feel stretched thin, as though the rhythm of life is all action and no pause. And yet, I find myself pushing back against those old sayings: "the devil makes work for idle hands" and "there's no rest for the wicked." Both suggest that busyness is a moral good, that constant doing is a measure of virtue. But I don't believe that.

And as the Gospel reminds us:

"Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28)

So as September unfolds, full of activity and opportunity, let's also remember that sacred pause. The stillness that renews. The gift of rest, which is not selfish but lifegiving.

May we be busy when it matters — and at peace when it matters even more.

Walk into its Past and Discover its Amazing History

Our story begins in 1662, when the Revd. Robert Yates, Vicar of St Elphin's Church was evicted on The Feast Day of St. Bartholmew for not undertaking the Act of Uniformity as ordered by King Charles II. This was not the first time the Revd Yates had fallen foul of authority. In 1649, during the English Civil War, he had spoken out against the Parliamentary organisation of Worship. He was arrested and tried at Lancaster Castle, where he was convicted and sentenced to death. He was determined not to retract his objection, and it was whilst he was writing his last speech and testament that he was reprieved.

He returned to Warrington and in 1662 when he was expelled from St Elpin's, many of his congregation followed him. The congregation that followed Robert Yates showed great courage in following their conscience and beliefs. Laws passed by Parliament made it an offence, punishable by fine, prison or transportation for five people beside family to meet for worship.

Discover how, under the Ministry of Dr. Charles Owen, the membership of the Chapel was 713.

During your visit, discover how Warrington Dissenting Academy was established in 1757.

How the members of the congregation shaped the economic growth and development of Warrington and their involvement in the political struggles of the time.

During the Heritage Festival, the Chapel and gardens will be open on Saturday 13th and Sunday 14th September from 10.00am until 4.00pm.

To close our contribution to the Heritage Festival, on Sunday 21st September at 3.00pm, Bill Cooke, a renowned local historian and author, will be presenting our Academy Lecture with the title:


